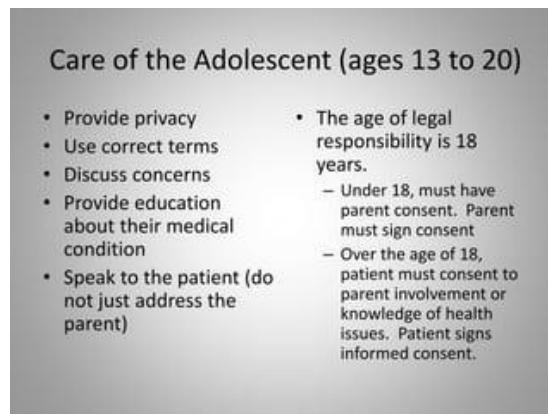


Figure 2: Age-Appropriate Care

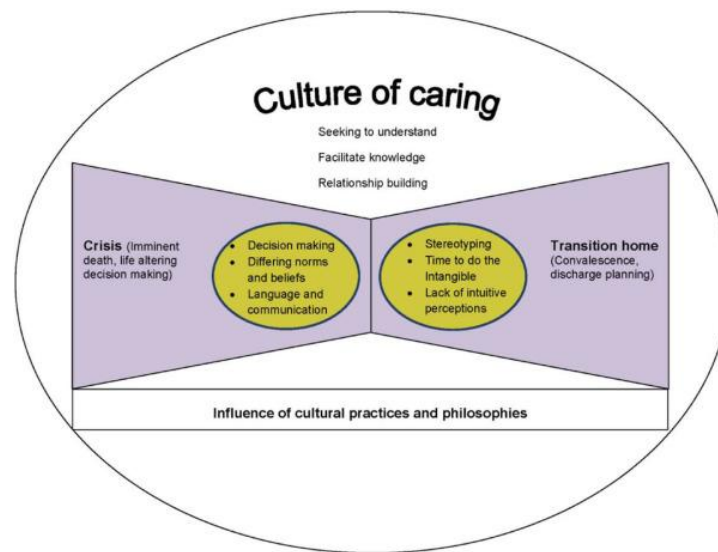


Figure 3: Cultural Sensitivity in Healthcare
