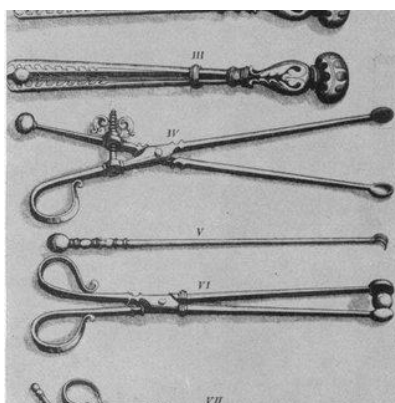


Figure 1: Evolution of Surgical Instruments in Ayurveda
