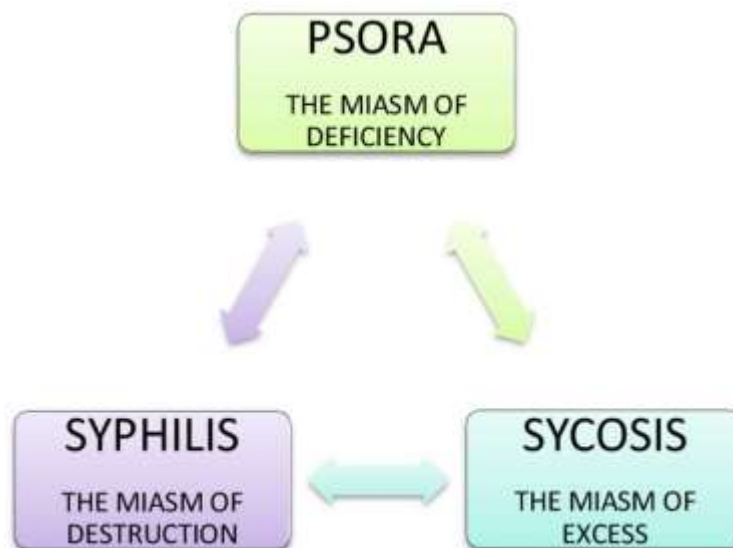


Figure: 1 The three Miasms
