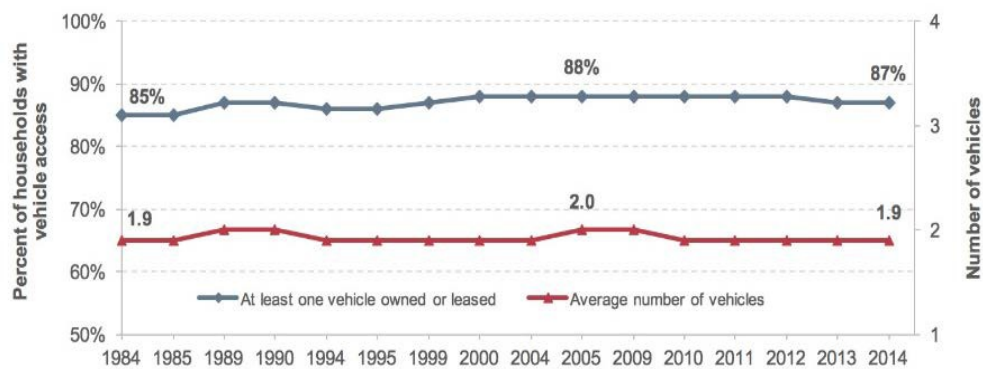


Figure 1: Percentage of households without access to a vehicle by income level
